Fain Dancers' 'Changes' in S.F.

Liss Fain, a choreographer from Boston who relocated to the Bay Area last year, is currently presenting the modern dance company she calls Liss Fain Dance at the New Performance Gallery.

Fain appears to be a highly skilled and intelligent choreographer whose dances mirror the constant state of change in which humans live out their lives. What gave Thursday's program of dances like the new "Sudden Changes" and last year's "Edging Toward Saturn" an obvious range and depth was the formal logic that Fain applies with such surety.

In "Sudden Changes," danced by Mary Carbonara, Alli Chagi, Jennifer Frees, Jeff Porter and Brenda Stine, the dancers appeared in the long first section in constantly and unexpectedly shifting groups of two and three. A skulking and hunched-over trio might dissolve into a twosome bent over on the floor, the third dancer then falling backward on them.

Slow Turn Dynamics

Vigorously pumping arms became caught up in the dynamics of a slow turn. Another group in a slow motion frieze would go crashing to the floor.

In "Sudden Changes," one got the feeling that Fain was offering a world in which its participants are victims of their surroundings. This environmental theme was given emotional emphasis in the second part, which was tinged with the melancholy of those who know that in moving they are going nowhere at all. In this section, Fain's dancers were often lost in a Rodin-like contemplation.

Composer Michael McNabb's compelling music for "Sudden Changes" involved a mix of live and electronic music, with McNabb's saxophone catching a listener in a web of doomsday intensity.

Three Components

In "Edging Toward Saturn," Fain presents a dance of three formally thought out components, although the phrases of the first section are often flat, lacking textural complexity. There were lots of entrances and exits for seven dancers, who gradually become identified as the duos and trios that will give the mini-dances of the second section as distinctive a look as the ethnic dances of 19th century ballet.

The state of flux that Fain presents ends with an all-out and noholds-barred physicality, its remarkable bravura buoyed up by David Fetcho's taped score.

In addition the dancers of "Sudden Changes," Tony Coray and Paul Medlyn were part of the crew.

The program will be repeated for the last time tonight at 8:30.
